

### Public Input Meeting February 5, 8, 13, & 15, 2025

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- Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) is a federally funded program administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to assist communities in recovering from disasters.
- The process of receiving CDBG-DR funding begins when Congress appropriates funds through HUD following a presidentially declared disaster. HUD then allocates the funds to state and local governments based on the disaster's impact.
- In January 2025, HUD allocated \$210 million in funding to Sarasota County.

# Background

- On January 16, 2025, HUD published a Federal Register Notice (FRN) identifying allocations for the Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) for major disasters occurring in 2023 and 2024.
- Funds are traditionally distributed to states for "most impacted and distressed" (MID) areas (e.g. counties) to apply to funds.

2022 Storms = \$201,535,000

<u>2024 Storms = \$210,094,000</u>

Total = \$411,629,000







## **Funding Requirements**

Requirement	Description	
Maximum of 15% of funds do not need tie back to Hurricane Ian (Mitigation)	Mitigation - activities that increase resilience to disasters and reduce or eliminate the long-term risk of loss of life, injury, damage to and loss of property, and suffering and hardship, by lessening the impact of future disasters.	
70% of funds must be used to benefit low to moderate income(LMI) persons.	LMI - defined as 80% Sarasota County's Area Median Income. For projects spanning a large service area, 51% of the project must benefit LMI persons.	
<b>All funds</b> must meet a HUD National Objective	HUD National Objectives: Benefit Low to Moderate Income Persons, have an urgent need, prevent or eliminate slum or blight	
All funds must be used in Sarasota County within six years		
All funds must address an unmet need - cannot have another funding source available

#### **Economic Revitalization**

<u>Must prioritize</u> commercial and retail districts in historically disadvantaged communities

Loans and grants to businesses

#### Job training programs

Financing of efforts that attract and retain workers in devasted communities

Business relocation assistance



**Eligible Uses** 

#### Mitigation

Any activities that increase resilience to disasters and reduce or eliminate the long-term risk of loss of life, injury, damage and loss to property, and suffering and hardship, by lessening the impact of future disasters

For the 15% mitigation setaside, no requirements that project has a direct or indirect tie-in to 2024 storm impacts



#### **Public Services**

Employment services, crime prevention and public safety, child care, health services, education programs, energy conservation, services for senior citizens, services for homeless persons, welfare services, recreational services.

Must be a new service or a quantifiable increase to an existing service.

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#### Planning

Feasibility studies, marketing studies, local mitigation plans, and long-term disaster recovery plans.
